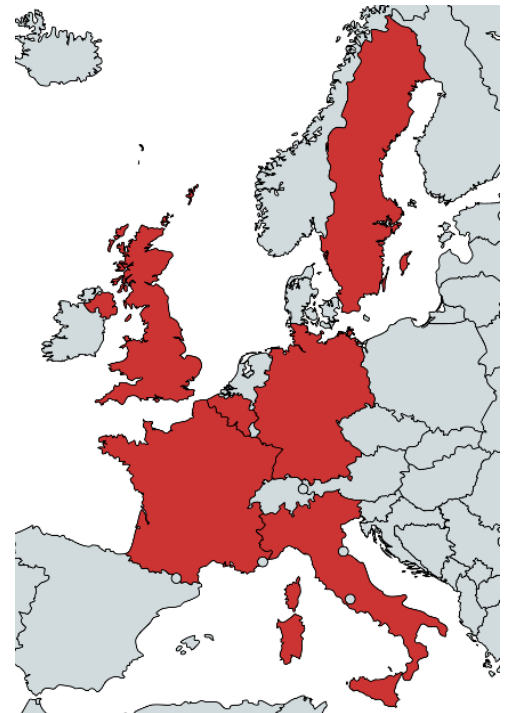
The benefits of joining the seminars

The project

NES, funded by **J.P.Morgan**, is a two-year-long project, that empowers incubators, accelerators and other entrepreneurship services to become more effective and inclusive by attracting and catering for the needs of new coming (potential) entrepreneurs, with a focus on refugees and ex-EU migrants.

Migration Policy Group (MPG), Belgium, coordinates this project as part of a five-country partnership composed of Kompass and Unternehmer ohne Grenzen - Germany, Agence pour la Diversite Entrepreneuriale (ADIVE) and GRDR - France, Fondazione ISMU - Italy, NyforetagarCentrum – Sweden, The Entrepreneurial Refugee Network (TERN) - United Kingdom.
